

SUMMARY OF 2024 ANNUAL REPORT

SOS MEDITERRANEE IS A HUMANITARIAN AND MARITIME RESCUE NGO FOUNDED IN 2015 IN RESPONSE TO THE ESCALATING HUMANITARIAN CRISIS IN THE CENTRAL MEDITERRANEAN AND AUTHORITIES' FAILURE TO TAKE ACTION TO PREVENT MORE DEATHS-32,345 SINCE 2014*. BETWEEN FEBRUARY 2016 AND JULY 2025, WE HAVE SAVED 42,577 PEOPLE IN DISTRESS IN THE CENTRAL MEDITERRANEAN, FIRST WITH OUR SHIP THE AQUARIUS AND NOW WITH THE OCEAN VIKING, SOS MEDITERRANEE HAS BEEN AWARDED SEVERAL PRIZES, AMONG THEM SPECIAL MENTION OF THE FRENCH REPUBLIC'S HUMAN RIGHTS PRIZE 2024. THE RIGHT LIVELIHOOD AWARD 2023, THE INTERNATIONAL MARITIME RESCUE FEDERATION AWARD 2022, AND THE UNESCO FÉLIX HOUPHOUËT-BOIGNY PEACE PRIZE 2017. FROM OUR PRESIDENT

n 2024, by turning their backs on international maritime law and renewing financial support to North African states that trample on the fundamental human rights of migrants, European states have once again disregarded their obligations. The geopolitical context further deteriorated, contributing to the dehumanization of these individuals and the erasure of each of their life stories. In Italy, the systematic assignment of disembarkation ports far from the operational zones, targeting exclusively humanitarian vessels, cost the Ocean Viking 80 days of rescue operations, while at least 2,573 men, women, and children lost their lives attempting the perilous crossing of the Mediterranean.

In this tragic context, 1,948 lives were nevertheless saved by SOS MEDITERRANEE teams in 2024, thanks to the support of tens of thousands of people who empower our rescue crews to keep reaching out. On board—with the support of the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies—they were cared for by our medical and protection teams, and then disembarked in safe places where their lives are no longer at risk, their vital needs are met, and their rights are respected.



Despite the tense international situation, we nevertheless remain hopeful, because citizen mobilization is stronger than ever. New local authorities, new donors, new supporters, and new volunteer recruits have joined us, strengthening this chain of solidarity and promoting the moral and legal principle of unconditional assistance to people in danger. The resilience of the survivors and the commitment of all our teams inspire us.

We had to activate the mass medical emergency plan.

The 25 rescued people were at the very limits of their physical endurance. Two men were unconscious, many others were suffering from hypothermia, and almost all were extremely dehydrated, having drunk only small amounts of seawater to survive for a week. All were in a state of severe psychological distress after witnessing the deaths of dozens of people, including family members, on their makeshift boat. **

OUR GUIDING PILLARS:



- > Xenophobic acts, violence, and human trafficking in Libya and Tunisia, prompting thousands to flee in unseaworthy boats
- > A decrease in the number of departures, but the mortality rate has risen sharply
- Official creation of a Tunisian Search and Rescue Region
- >Intensification of interceptions by the Libyan and Tunisian coastguards, financed by Europe, and a corresponding decrease in arrivals in Italy
- >Ongoing obstruction of search and rescue NGOs by the Italian authorities

OUR RESCUE OPERATIONS

- >27 days of detention for the Ocean Viking under Italy's Piantedosi Decree.
- >80 days of operations lost due to additional navigation by the Ocean Viking to reach distant ports
- > A proliferation of armed instigators at sea
- > Mass emergency medical plan launched in March: we were able to rescue 25 drowning people, but 60 others perished at sea.



At least **2,573** people died or disappeared in the Mediterranean (compared to 3,155 in 2023*), among them were **1,810** people in the Central Mediterranean (compared to 2,526 in 2023)¹

55,205 people forcibly intercepted

66,855 people arrived in Italy and Malta (compared to 158,032 in 2023)

80% cases of distress identified by NGOs (lookouts on humanitarian ships or aircrafts and civilian initiatives such as Alarm Phone.)

SAVE, PROTECT, BEAR WITNESS



- > Migratory journeys: having fled war, violence, and extreme poverty, survivors need diverse types of medical care
- >Out of 31 countries, one third of survivors are from Syria
- > Medical care on board to treat the consequences of the journey and the violence suffered throughout
- >Special care for women and children
- > More than 90% of women crossing the Mediterranean are victims of sexual violence
- **31 nationalities** represented among the people saved by the *Ocean Vikin*g
- 152 women (8% of all survivors)
- **389 children** (20%), of whom 72 % are traveling alone
- **21** children < age 5 (6 % of all children)
- **385 people** traveling with family
- **7** people with handicaps
- **1,357** medical consultations on board
- **14,754** meals prepared for rescued people

BEARING WITNESS AND MOBILIZING

- > A strong increase in the number of volunteers, creation of a collectivity in Corsica, and of a volunteer group in Belgium
- >18 public events, including two musical performances and a school project around a graphic novel based on the author's experience on board the Ocean Viking.
- >Second edition of a large-scale concert in Marseille
- > First conference on the law of the sea and maritime solidarity in Montpellier
- > Festival in Paris with 11 events
- > Lectures at six universities across the U.S., U.K., and Qatar



More than **900 volunteers** in France alone, mobilized across 22 volunteer groups

511 events, from concerts to film screenings

26,380 students, from primary through secondary school, attended educational events

122 local and regional governments supporting SOS MEDITERRANEE

5,997 media mentions in France and **50** interviews by our spokespeople



DISTRIBUTION OF RESOURCES BY ORIGIN (€14,222,232*)


